

1. Language & Oral Heritage, Native regional dialects, traditional colloquialisms, old English/early Celtic linguistic roots

- Yorkshire, Geordie, Scouse, and West Country dialects (“nowt”, “owt”, “thee/thou”, “ey up”)
- Scots and Ulster Scots (“wee”, “bairn”, “ken”)
- Old English/Anglo-Saxon terms still in daily use
- Welsh and Scottish Gaelic vocabulary and place-name roots
- Cockney rhyming slang and Brittonic Celtic substrate words

Oral storytelling: ancestral legends, folk histories, clan tales, migration and settlement sagas

- Arthurian legends (King Arthur, Merlin, Excalibur, Glastonbury, Tintagel)
- Robin Hood and Sherwood Forest tales
- Anglo-Saxon and Viking settlement narratives
- Scottish Border Reiver tales and Welsh Mabinogion stories
- Hereward the Wake resistance sagas

Folk poetry, proverbs, old sayings, mnemonic sayings passed down generations

- “Red sky at night, shepherd’s delight” and other weather proverbs
- “An Englishman’s home is his castle” and “Many a mickle makes a muckle”
- Scottish Border ballads and Welsh englynion poetry
- Rhyming mnemonics for plants, seasons, and history

Historic chants, battle cries, communal call-and-response speech for gatherings

- “God for Harry, England, and St George!” (Agincourt)
- Scottish clan war cries and rallying calls
- Anglo-Saxon battle chants and medieval marching songs
- Welsh eisteddfod call-and-response and Morris dance songs
- Pub and sea shanty communal responses

2. Belief Systems & Ancestral Customs Ancestor reverence and memorial traditions

- Churchyard visits and storytelling in English villages
- Scottish and Irish graveyard traditions
- Welsh family memorial stones
- Home ancestor altars with photos and heirlooms
- All Souls’ Day gatherings

Seasonal solstice/equinox festivals, ancient harvest rites, land-honouring rituals

- Midsummer bonfires at Stonehenge and Avebury
- Lammas harvest festivals and Wassailing
- Yule log and Winter Solstice traditions
- May Day / Beltane celebrations with Maypoles
- Equinox observances at sacred sites

Historic folk spiritual beliefs, nature-centric customs tied to local landscapes, rivers and hills

- Sacred wells (Chalice Well, Glastonbury)
- Glastonbury Tor and other hill spirits

- Veneration of oak, ash, and thorn trees

Traditional rites of passage: coming-of-age, marriage, community oath-making, funeral observances

- Church weddings and handfasting influences
 - Scottish “jumping the broom” and English rural customs
 - Funeral wakes with feasting and storytelling
 - Village coming-of-age and community oath traditions
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3. Visual Symbols & Iconography, Tribal/ancestral spiral, triskelion, knotwork and shield emblems

- Celtic spirals, triskelions, and Insular knotwork
- Anglo-Saxon and early English shield patterns
- Pictish and British symbolic designs
- Trefoil and quaternary knots

Historic heraldry, clan markings, family crests, regional symbolic colours

- English county coats of arms and heraldic animals
- Scottish clan tartans and badges
- Yorkshire white rose, Lancashire red rose, and Welsh red dragon
- St George's Cross and Tudor rose

Traditional wood carving, stone marking, runic/early indigenous inscriptions

- Anglo-Saxon runic carvings (e.g., Ruthwell Cross)
- Celtic high crosses and traditional pub-sign carvings
- Church misericords and bench ends
- Pictish symbol stones

Historic banner, flag and standard designs for community gatherings

- St George's Cross, Saltire, and Red Dragon flags
 - Medieval guild and battle standards
 - Maypole ribbons and village procession banners
 - County and parish flags
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4. Folk Music, Song & Dance, Regional folk instrumental music

- Northumbrian smallpipes and English fiddles
- Welsh triple harp and Celtic lever harp
- Morris dance accordion and drum traditions
- Bodhrán and early lyre reconstructions

Work songs, battle hymns, harvest ballads, communal drinking/gathering songs

- Cornish and English sea shanties
- Scottish Border ballads and bothy songs
- Harvest home and pub drinking songs
- "Agincourt Carol" battle hymns

Traditional circle dances, processional folk dances, clan formation dances

- English Morris dancing and country dances
- Maypole and sword dances
- Scottish ceilidh dances
- Welsh and Northern processional dances

Vocal harmonies and unaccompanied oral folk singing styles

- English unaccompanied traditions (Copper Family)
 - Welsh male voice choirs
 - Scottish Gaelic waulking songs
 - Pub and communal sing-alongs
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5. Craft, Textile & Material Heritage, Historic weaving, wool textile patterns, clan tartans and traditional clothing

- Scottish clan tartans and Harris Tweed
- English woollen and smock traditions
- Welsh wool and Aran-style sweaters
- Medieval embroidered garments

Blacksmithing, metalwork for weaponry, tools, ceremonial regalia

- Pattern-welded Anglo-Saxon swords
- Traditional English farriery and wrought ironwork
- Celtic torcs, brooches, and ceremonial pieces
- Agricultural tools and dirks

Woodworking, hall and longhouse carpentry, traditional furniture

- Cruck-frame and Tudor timber-framed halls
- Oak settles and carved roof beams
- Traditional English furniture making
- Welsh love spoons and architectural carving

Pottery, leatherwork, hand-forged jewellery with ancestral motifs

- Staffordshire slipware and traditional English pottery
 - Celtic knotwork jewellery
 - Tooled leather goods
 - Hand-forged brooches and heraldic items
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6. Cuisine & Communal Food Traditions, Seasonal native foraged foods, historic crop and livestock dishes

- Nettles, samphire, elderflowers, blackberries
- Full English breakfast, Yorkshire pudding, Cornish pasties
- Game dishes, Welsh cawl, and regional stews
- Haggis and oat-based traditions

Communal feast layouts

- Medieval long-table great hall feasts
- Village harvest suppers and pub gatherings
- Scottish clan and Burns Suppers
- Yule and wedding feasts

Traditional brewing, mead, cider and historic communal drink customs

- Real ales, Scottish whisky, and heather ale
- West Country cider and traditional mead
- Wassail bowls and pub toasting
- Metheglin and communal drinking

Ritual food prepared for ancestor remembrance days and seasonal observances

- Soul cakes for All Souls' Day
 - Yule cakes and mince pies
 - Colcannon and barmbrack at Samhain
 - Harvest loaves and special breads

- English medieval guilds and friendly societies
- Scottish Highland clan system
- Welsh extended family (teulu)
- Village mutual aid networks

Codes of honour, loyalty to community, ancestral duty and stewardship of land

- English yeoman "fair play" and sportsmanship
- Gaelic hospitality codes
- Land stewardship in rural communities
- Oath-bound loyalty and ancestral duty

Historic local dispute resolution customs, communal decision-making

- Parish councils and village moots
- Anglo-Saxon assemblies
- Scottish march days
- Manorial and local mediation traditions

Multi-generational family values, interfamily union and shared responsibility

- Multi-generational rural households
 - Godparent and fosterage systems
 - Neighbourly aid during hardship
 - Community responsibility at life events
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8. Architecture & Living Spaces, Longhouse / heritage hall design principles

- Cruck-framed longhouses and Tudor great halls
- Central hearth layouts for gatherings
- Timber-framed communal buildings
- Scottish blackhouses (for comparison)

Traditional stonework, timber framing, hearth-centric hall layouts

- Dry-stone walling (Cotswolds, North)
- Oak timber framing and inglenook fireplaces
- Carved beams and memorial features
- Church and hall architecture

Sacred landscape spaces: barrows, standing stone sites, ancestral burial grounds

- Stonehenge, Avebury, and Neolithic barrows
- Glastonbury and other sacred hills
- Historic churchyards on older sites
- Bronze Age and chambered tombs

Village/communal settlement historic layout logic

 - Linear settlements and market towns

Competitive clan trials, strength contests at seasonal fairs

- Tug-of-war and wrestling
 - Caber toss and strength events (Highland Games)
 - Traditional lifting stones and agricultural contests

Ancestor remembrance days

- Memorial events in heritage halls
